В.	Skagit HOME Consortium: Options for Whatcom County 2018- 2022	Kayla Schott-Bresler of Skagit County Public Health provided an overview of HOME Consortium funding. In 2015, Skagit County, Island County, Whatcom County and 16 municipalities formed a HOME consortium to apply for access to an entitlement HUD grant that is expected to deliver approximately \$900,000 for the tri-county area (excluding City of Bellingham) in 2018. • 20% of this grant (\$150,000) is awarded on a competitive basis • 10% of the grant will be withheld for administrative expenses • 70% of the grant is split among the three counties according to demographics • This amounts to approximately \$220,000 for Whatcom County in 2018 • Whatcom County currently uses funding for tenant-based rental assistance program operated through Opportunity Council	Kayla Schott-Bresler

	 Allowable uses of funding do not include case management or operations, however it may cover the following: Rehabilitation of owner-occupied housing Development of new housing units (capital only- no operations costs) Studios and 1-bedrooms are in need Down-payment assistance for low-income home purchasers Tenant-based rental assistance (less of a priority) Units must be affordable for households at 80% AMI for at least 10 years if owned, or 20 years if rented; other incorporated funding sources may require longer periods For a single family home, this means purchase price in \$150-175K range in Whatcom Cooperative Housing Association (CHA) CHAs allow a group of individuals to collectively buy/construct a building and then rent out units based on their terms; may be co-owned by an outside agency Possibly clean and sober housing in the form of specialized TBRA support or acquisition and rehab (or purchase) of a home bought by a Community Housing Development Organization (CHODO) for this purpose 	
C. Legislative Impacts on Housing Funds	 HUD's preference is that projects be located outside of City of Bellingham limits This still allows some periphery neighborhoods such as Alderwood, Geneva, Tweed Twenty, Yew Street Hill, Britton Road, etc. HUD may be willing to allow rental assistance use within COB, but should be last priority In Skagit County the fund is being used for home development through a community land trust and in Island County it will likely fund the development of a rental project HUD is encouraging the development of rental housing for the competitive allotment Funds can be banked over several years to build capacity for capital projects The competitive portion (20% of funds) must pass through a (CHODO), such as Kulshan Community Land Trust, Opportunity Council, or Mercy Housing Applications will be released in the Fall Supplemental tax credits may be available for projects in "high opportunity areas" 7 of the 8 identified housing priorities were passed in the most recent legislative session 	Anne, Barbara
riousing runus	 HEN will not receive new funds, but has expanded eligibility to serve people with substance use disorders and the Aged/Blind/Disabled Cash grants will provide about \$200/month per eligible person

	 Not all HEN funding was used last year, but early trends indicate we will use it all this year Source of income discrimination was banned statewide, making it easier for people with vouchers to find housing A new risk mitigation program was created to reimburse landlords for up to \$5,000 in damages to their units HB 1570 increased the amount of document recording fees and made them permanent This will increase funding for Consolidated Homeless Grant Funding The due date for the Local Plan Update was postponed by Dept. of Commerce until December 2019 	
County Position on Priorities for Funding	 The additional funding resulting from increased document recording fees will be about \$750,000 annually Discussions with local housing providers have identified urgent need for case managers As many at 7 full time positions could be added to help oversee use of available rental assistance Within Health Department, there is need for more assistance in housing program A shared supervisor for the housing program, developmental disabilities, and veterans programs as well as a support position specifically for the housing specialist have been identified as needs	Anne, Barbara

a. Homeless Strategies Workgroup and Shelter	 The 509 Girard site has been taken off the table due to costs and concerns from the public The last meeting of this group will be on Thursday, May 10th 	Anne
b. COB Update	The city is preparing a site to install lockers for the use of homeless population The lockers will be installed in parking lot of Bellingham Police Department in early August The city council is about to approve a new 5-year consolidated plan Includes \$1.3 million from HUD, Consolidated Development Block Grants, and HOME funding, which is more than previous years There will be a new housing project (details to be determined) on Deemer and Bakerview Road City is considering putting a housing levy on the ballot for November to replace levy due to expire in '19 New levy would bring in about \$4 Million/year Previous levy set a seven-year goal of constructing 417 units With one year left, already 489 units have been constructed The City has increased support for case management and permanent supportive housing There is a renewed importance for City and County staff to align priorities and define non-redundant roles for cooperation	Samya
